Why should you use safer injecting practices for every hit? Safer injecting practices can prevent the transmission of Hepatitis C and other blood-borne viruses such as HIV and Hepatitis B. It can also help prevent dirty hits, bruising, blood poisoning and abscesses. If you are Hepatitis C positive it is still important to protect yourself as you can be reinfected with a different or the same strain of Hepatitis C or with Hepatitis B and HIV. If you can't get new equipment you could try using drugs another way such as snorting, swallowing, smoking or stuffing (up ya bum).

Injecting a drug (rather than smoking, swallowing or sniffing it) carries a much greater risk of overdose, vein damage and infection. However, if you are injecting, using the information in this series of posters can help you reduce the risks you are taking. The main risks you can expose yourself to when injecting are: hepatitis infection (viruses that can attack your liver); HIV infection (the virus that can cause AIDS); overdose; vein damage; infection from bacteria; and increasing your level of drug dependence.
